On Saturday he recommended a man found malingering to be sent away, he was not. On Sunday he informed the Master that his Inmate's health was becoming impaired and either to send him away or to remove him, that lately an inmate lost his life by being improperly detained in this Ward he answered "No you say he will sleep there to night."

The Police and the inhabitants complain of this nuisance, and he is alarmed lest for result.

The Midwife got out of Bed and had her brought to Hospital at once. That himself and the Father forthwith went for the Doctor and the Dr. said to the father in his presence he was sick and to call on Mr. Joyce to attend her. The Dr. said he was in charge at the time of fever patients as follows:

but the Dr. came in about a quarter of an hour afterwards but the woman was confined before him or Mr. Joyce who was coming over from the Fever Hospital. This was about 10 o'clock in the morning.
