3/4/96 Letter from the Local Government Board dated 25 September 1896 referring to the estimate of New Rates agreed to at the meeting of the 12th Inst and inquiring the Guardians' reasons for reducing the amount required for the ensuing year's expenditure by the large sum of £780.
